PASTOR'S NOTES

Dr. George C. Anderson

Some Perspective:

There are some vital activities of church life which theologians have called "The Marks of the Church." These vital activities include worship, preaching, teaching and pastoral care. Notice a pandemic is not included

in that list.

In early 2020—now one year

ago—our congregation had to adapt quickly to calls for limiting gatherings, masking and maintaining distance. We could not stop being the church, but we had to learn new ways to keep old promises to be the church. Thus, the theme for our educational year became Church Beyond Walls. Worship and education was offered more through our YouTube channel than in our sanctuary and classrooms. Pastoral care continued with calls and cards. We continued to conduct baptisms, weddings, and funerals. We can all be proud of the ways that the congregation has been faithfully resilient in adapting so quickly and well.

Now we have settled into a "Temporary Normal." Members have become used to what was at first quite different: learning, meeting and giving online. However, as more people get vaccinated and COVID cases decline, we will begin transitioning back to congregational life and programs within our beautiful facilities. Eventually, a day will come when the pandemic is over. When that day comes, much of what we miss will be restored, but we will also have evolved for having learned through the experience.

Please remain supportive and patient as we go through the transition to a post-pandemic congregation. Until we get through the transition, guidelines about capacity, masking and the need for RSVPs will keep changing. Take it upon yourself to remain connected and to help others stay connected. Remain constant with your participation, financial support and prayer. We count on you to remember that the health and future of the congregation is to some significant degree the responsibility of all its members.

Some Celebrations:

Though we are in the middle of a journey, let's not forget to celebrate some of the amazing ways our church has been faithfully resilient during a pandemic. First of all, celebrate the church's generosity. When the pandemic began, the session established a "Local Relief" offering that would go to local ministries dealing with crisis needs. Over and beyond the local mission support of the budget, members gave over \$58,000 through this offering, and that number continues to grow in 2021.

Let's celebrate the way the church has established its online presence: the website, YouTube channel, Facebook pages, podcasts (Second on the



Mount and Child of God) a weekly pastor's email, and live streamed announcements.

Let's celebrate the quality ways the church live streams worship services, memorial services and important Let's celebrate the members who reach out to other members, either on their own or through the Ambas-

conversations. Let's also celebrate how those offerings and more can be found on the church's YouTube channel. Did you miss the sermon on Happiness? Or Carter Brothers' classes on C.S. Lewis' The Screwtape Letters? Or the conversations with Bill Lee and Kipper Nottingham? Or the lectures given by our Evening Bible School speaker, Rev. Jenny McDevitt? All can be found on what is now a rich resource for worship, study and reflection. sadors Group or Visitation Committee. The ministers know you are checking on each other because we get constant communication about illnesses, deaths, and births.

Let's celebrate the evolution of the church staff so it can better serve the church during the pandemic and beyond. Rev. Elizabeth Link has become Executive Pastor. We have welcomed a Pastor's Assistant in Meredith Koliba, an Engagement Coordinator in Christal Pearson, and will soon welcome a new Associate Pastor for Youth and Young Adults in Rev. Ben Brannan.

Let's celebrate God remaining faithful in holding up this congregation in these times as God has done since the church was founded so many years before.

Looking Ahead:

Looking past the pandemic, I anticipate that online worship and education will remain a part of our ministry. Not only will the YouTube channel remain a resource, but I anticipate that people will be able to attend worship, meetings and classes remotely even as others meet in person.

I anticipate that the Service and Outreach Committee will continue to stay in close communication with mission partners so that we can remain nimble in responding to needs.

I anticipate a fresh emphasis on people participating in opportunities that we might have previously taken for granted: dinners, retreats, weekly worship and education, Bible Schools, opportunities to serve, and more.

I am sure that the Mission Build Campaign, which was suspended because of the pandemic, will become active again. After all, the need for the four projects to be completed has only grown greater. They are the renovation of the AO House for mission use, finishing the hospital in the Dominican Republic, replacing the Presbyterian Community Center facilities, and the renovation and transformation of a building at Union Presbyterian Seminary to become the William R. Klein Leadership Institute.

Yes, 2020 brought about a significant amount of change. What has not changed is the vitality of this congregation, the faithfulness of God, and the bright future that lies ahead.

Church Finances:

Here is my thumbnail sketch of Second Presbyterian Church's financial story in 2021. The congregation finished well in the black this past year thanks to pandemic-induced cutbacks to programs, careful monitoring of expenses and the generosity of the congregation. A surplus totaling \$113,377 has been built over the last two years. That may seem like a lot of money, but swings can be significant. Only a few years ago the church was over \$200,00 in the red. The "Faithful Resilience" stewardship season ended with many members increasing their pledge but with a decline in the total number of pledges leading to a flat end result. The 2021 budget, constructed to support a resurgence from the pandemic, reflects a \$40,000 deficit. This does not mean that we will finish 2021 in the red, for we believe that some members, while feeling uncertain about making a pledge, intend to continue to support their church. However, If the church finishes 2021 with a deficit, the church will draw on last year's surplus.

Meanwhile, the designated funds of the church, which have limited impact on the budget, did well this past year and were able to provide funds for ministries for which they were intended such as capital improvements and mission support.



CHRISTIAN EDUCATION The Rev. Elizabeth N.H. Link

"Be nimble." This was our Christian Education Committee's motto for 2020. The year began smoothly, but March threw us all a curve ball.

The PC(USA) Book of Order states that the primary place for Christian education is the home. That reality has never been more true than it has this past year. Thanks to technology like You-Tube, iMovie, and Zoom, most of our opportunities for Christian nurture have taken place from the comfort and Staycation Bible School integrated safety of members' homes.

Knowing the importance of seeing each other's faces, Christian education made a concerted effort this year to get the voices and faces of Second Presbyterian Church before its membership. Seeing our children, youth, and adults on the screen has helped bridge the gap distance has created.

Children's Sunday school and Children, Worship, and Wonder continued almost seamlessly over recorded storytelling and weekly emailed family lessons and activities. The Child of God podcast emerged at the best possible time ahead of the pandemic, and Bible stories have been shared with children of all ages on car rides, from kitchen tables, and as a part of bedtime routines. Our church youth stepped up almost immediately and volunteered to read and act out Bible stories for the children on camera, all while they continued their own meetings outdoors and over Zoom.

Adult education has evolved to be a multi-pronged and multi-platformed approach. Sunday school continued almost uninterrupted for the Open Door and Covenant Conversation classes, who met over Zoom. Various small group studies have taken place

Prayer Group meets weekly over Zoom. Short-term adult education series have been made available online thanks to volunteer teachers and their periodic "tea time" group discussions. The women in our church were able to hold a half-day mini-retreat centered on Jeremiah while at the socially distanced Gals Gather 'Round at Braeloch in November.

for adults, and the Contemplative

Evening VBS and Morning VBS plans for children and adults, as the church centered around Gospel stories at the table. Thanks to the creativity of our adult and youth volunteers, we shared music, crafts, recipes, and Bible stories together. It was exciting to think of new opportunities to learn and grow, even while we were apart.

Special home worship kits were made available in advance of Rally Day. Participation in our church Advent kits was overwhelmingly positive, and some 80 households participated in Advent wreath lighting and daily devotional reading.

Before 2020, the Christian Education Committee realized that one of our growing edges existed among our homebound members. Prior to this year, nearly all our educational offerings relied on one's ability to physically travel and sit in-person for a class or event. This past year has taught us relevant, engaging, even relational education can take place from the home. Our new challenge moving forward will be to integrate home-centered members into the overall program of Christian education at Second.

We are grateful for the flexibility and willingness of Second Presbyterian



This web is comprised of a Youth Ministry Team, a Youth Council, Youth Advisers, and a broader church community willing to say yes to every request for hospitality and care, and it has held strong during a season when we have had to reconsider every aspect of how to gather for fellowship and spiritual growth.



discern how to navigate the tricky waters of 2020 by answering questions such as: When, and how should we gather the youth together? What games are COVID-safe, yet also fun? How often should we meet online? Should we plan a mission trip for the coming summer? During this time of not knowing what to predict or how to plan, the YMT has served as a sounding board, a brainstorming team, and a cadre of volunteers who ensured our gatherings were safe and fun.

The Youth Council is another fantastic layer of support for youth programming. This group consists of high school juniors and seniors who have agreed to take on a leadership role in Youth Group. They helped plan events and committed to attending said events. This year, YC members chose the theme for the year, *Live in Love*. They took turns planning and leading Zoom game nights. They also played a significant role in creating the liturgy and music for the first ever virtual Youth Sunday. They rose to the occasion with grace and compassion. It's fair to say that without the Youth Council, much of the virtual programming, if not all of it, would have fallen apart. They have served as the glue to bind this group together through the disappointments of cancelled events and the loss of beloved traditions.

Youth Advisors are adults who have committed to showing up to Youth Group, Midweek Manna, and Midweek Man-Night. Whether we met in person or online, YA's were there ready to greet youth, to lead games, to set-up and clean-up. They monitored social distancing requirements when we met in person and led small groups online. They provided a safety net for Youth Group and their love for the youth shone bright through their supportive presence.

The greater church community has held this Youth Group together through countless ways during this difficult year by committing to prayer and acts of service for youth. Whether by baking, assembling ice-cream sundaes, delivering cookie surprises, or through faithful prayer, the congregation has strengthened the threads of support to form a web that not even a global pandemic could break. Thank you to all—present, past, and future—who hold the youth of this church together in love.


YOUNG ADULTS

ENGAGEMENT Christal Pearson, Coordinator

In July of 2020, Ann Lawson, our Shared Ministry Coordinator, retired after seven years of faithful service. Before her departure, however, she faced the challenges of outreach and engagement during the COVID pandemic. When the church closed in March, Ann organized a group of 12 church members who dutifully contacted visitors and church members to check in, offer support, and discern needs, which was instrumental in maintaining connection during this time.

Over the summer, the position evolved to what is now the Engagement Coordinator. I came on staff in October, and I have been joyfully busy learning how to continue Ann's good work.

In spite of our inability to gather for worship, fellowship, and celebration, the church did grow in 2020, and we welcomed 33 new members! I am also happy to report that we have a growing list of visitors who enjoy our online services and are excited to experience our church in person.

I can't wait to bring our visitors and new members into the fold. I know they will be received with warmth, hospitality, and love.

SERVICE AND OUTREACH Virginia Garden and Beth Smith, Committee Co-Chairs

2020 began innocently enough for Service and Outreach, as we greeted the new year with a January loose plate offering to benefit the Second Presbyterian Medical Mission Trip to the Dominican Republic. The church hosted Family Promise guests at the Alpha Omega House for a week in January, providing shelter, meals, and hospitality for families who would otherwise be homeless. Children at Highland Park Elementary School received their weekend pack-a-snack bags, as usual. Service and Outreach had planned for a normal year of working with our mission partners and managing the benevolence budget made possible by 2020 congregational pledges and non-pledged giving (see budget details on pages 12-13). The terms COVID-19, social distancing, face masks, and Zoom were not yet common in our vocabulary.

In February, we collected loose plate donations for the Casa Mariposa Detention Visitation Program which provides support for men and women in Eloy Detention Center, an immigrant prison in Arizona. At the end of February, a full team of surgical/medical/construction volunteers traveled to the Dominican Republic community of San Juan de la Maguana to serve the impoverished people of that region, providing life-saving surgeries, medical clinics, and construction assistance. Little did we know that this trip would be our last face-to-face mission activity for a year due to the pandemic that was about to close churches, schools, and alter life as we knew it.

In mid-March, all church activities, including worship and our March loose plate offering for Helping Hands of Franklin County, were suspended. In April, the Service and Outreach Committee met using the now familiar technology of Zoom to prayerfully consider how the church might respond to the pandemic needs of the community.

The Local Relief Fund was born in mid-April. With children out of school and parents out of work, we knew that food insecurity would be a hardship faced by many, and that many would also struggle to pay rent and utilities. Service and Outreach contacted our local mission partners, prioritized agencies with greatest need, then asked the congregation to help these partners through our Local Relief Fund. In the spirit of Christ, the church responded generously, giving over and above their 2020 pledges.

While Service and Outreach has responded to other needs in 2020, pandemic relief has been the focus. From mid-April through December, total relief offerings totaled almost \$60,000: \$58,104 for local relief and \$1,686 for U.S. hurricane and wildfire relief through the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance program. Service and Outreach is so grateful for your support.

Your relief donations have been used to assist our mission partners in many impactful ways.

• **Feeding Southwest Virginia** (FSWVA), our local food bank, created pop-up food distribution centers and expand-

ed children's feeding programs. In April, eight COVID-19 mass distribution sites were set up in the Roanoke Valley. Hot meals were provided at eighteen children's direct feeding sites such as libraries, rec centers, and Kids Soar. Pamela Irvine, President and CEO of FSWVA, thanked Second Presbyterian "for your generosity that flows from your heart to the hearts of others you'll never meet."

- **Family Promise** moved to alternative shelter options when churches were not available and established a Coronavirus Relief Fund to provide direct assistance for rent and utilities for families who had found permanent housing. Mariam DiPasquale, Family Promise's Housing Stability Manager, told us, "Your gifts during these times are so important as we help our families stay housed as they're struggling with loss of employment and loss of childcare."
- **Society of St. Andrew** works to harvest healthy food that might otherwise go to waste, and distributes it to food pantries, senior centers, and food banks. Chesley Vouden, Director of Church Relations said, "I want to thank Second Presbyterian . . . for your support, especially this summer. You all have been faithful supporters for years and years, and this summer you really came through with the COVID-19 pandemic and all the extra farm to family food boxes we've been delivering and all the extra gleaning."
- Relief funds helped expand hours at the **Presbyterian Community Center** Pathways for Youth program and the **West End Center** to provide support and supervision for students attending school virtually.
- Donations assisted **Child Health Investment Partnership** (CHIP) as they pivoted to virtual visits, counseling, and play therapy and as they delivered basic necessities and child enrichment activities to families of young children each week.
- **Roanoke Area Ministries** was grateful for relief funds as they established new COVID-19 safety protocols and responded to increased requests for emergency financial assistance to help pay rent and utilities.
- In November and December, relief fund offerings provided gifts for the **West End Center**'s Angel Tree project and were given in lieu of our Christmas Eve Manger Offering for **Family Promise**.

The continued generosity of the congregation is a witness to the hope that followers of Jesus can make a difference in the lives of others, those whom we know and those whom we have never met. Our donations have helped many in the Roanoke Valley, but as Jesus taught us, joy and peace enter hearts, not only of those who receive kindness and generosity; these graces also abide in and shape the hearts of those who give. Here are just some of the local ministries which have received support from Second Presbyterian's Local Relief Loose Plate Offerings in 2020:

- The Preschool operating balance at the close of 2020 was \$52,193.




