ALPHA OMEGA HOUSE RENOVATIONS

AO House Renovation to Serve Family Promise

Family Promise of Greater Roanoke provides transitional housing, services, job assistance and more, with the specific goal to keep local families out of homelessness. Family Promise al-

lows our congregation to provide a meaningful and loving response to a huge community need. Our church's role in serving these families is three-fold: We provide financial support for the organization, prayerful support of the families, and a home for the families 5-6 weeks a year in our Alpha Omega House. When the families are on-site, we (with our Beth Israel neighbors) prepare and serve dinner, spend the night, and are a constant presence in the home. Currently, there is no working shower in the AO House, thus children must go to school without an evening bath and working parents cannot shower to start their day. Further, the rooms do not have working windows, and the use of the two bathrooms becomes difficult if we are at capacity with four families.

There is a great need for additional congregations across Roanoke to use our space when it is upgraded to serve families in the program. It becomes a home for these children and their parents, giving them a place of warmth and stability during an otherwise difficult time.

Hospitality, a large support system of volunteers, and new life skills enable over 90% of families to move to and maintain permanent housing.



PRESBYTERIAN COMMUNITY CENTER RENOVATIONS

Presbyterian Community Center

Second Presbyterian Church has partnered with the Presbyterian Community Center (PCC) since its founding over five decades ago. The PCC has grown beyond meeting crisis needs and added programs that address life conditions that keep people in the cycle of poverty. A powerful example is the Pathways for Youth after-school program that offers mentoring, tutoring and counseling that keep children in school and then into college. Healthcare, workplace training and daycare are goals for expansion. However, the PCC must make a major shift from present facilities, both because they are tapped out in terms of space and because of high maintenance. Through the Mission Build Campaign, Second Presbyterian can offer strategic help right at the point of transition to a growing effort to bring the Southeast community to stability.

In 2018, PCC provided \$166,970 in resources through the Emergency Services Program: benefiting 5,556 individuals which included 1,368 senior citizens and 1,692 children.

Westminster Hall will feature the latest technology and will be fully accessible, with an elevator to the upper floors. With this transformation, continuing education students will interact daily with degree students, faculty, and staff as all Richmond campus activities will operate from the historic guadrangle.

Naming and Acknowledgment

In naming the Center for Dr. William R. Klein, Union Presbyterian Seminary wishes to honor Dr. Klein's lifelong dedication to the church and his service to the people of the Roanoke Valley. Many generations at Second Presbyterian Church Roanoke have been touched by his ministry. Union Presbyterian Seminary would also like to honor Dr. Klein for his work at the Seminary after his graduation in 1954: for his service as a Seminary trustee and campaign chair. and for his teaching-mentoring of numerous Seminary students at the Didactic Seminar on Reformed Theology. The hope is to commence construction once 75% of the total project cost is attained. Construction will take approximately 20 months.

Through the generosity of Second Presbyterian Church members and the Roanoke Valley's Presbyterian community, Union Presbyterian Seminary has

set a goal to raise \$2.5 million to establish the Dr. William R. Klein Center on the main floor at Westminster. A centrally located donor recognition plaque at the Center will acknowledge generous gifts.
