ALPHA OMEGA HOUSE RENOVATIONS

AO House Renovation to Serve Family Promise:

- Family Promise of Greater Roanoke provides transitional housing, services, job assistance and more, with the specific goal to keep local families out of homelessness.
- Our church's role in serving these families is three-fold:
 We provide financial support for the organization, prayerful support of the families, and a home for the families 5-6 weeks a year in our Alpha Omega House. When the families are on-site, we prepare and serve dinner, spend the night, and are a constant presence in the home.
- Currently, there is no working shower in the AO House. The rooms do not have working windows, and the use of the two bathrooms becomes difficult if we are at capacity with four families.
- There is a great need for additional congregations across Roanoke to use our space when it is upgraded to serve families in the program.
- The AO House becomes a home for these children and their parents, giving them a place of warmth and stability during an otherwise difficult time.



PRESBYTERIAN COMMUNITY CENTER RENOVATIONS

The PCC has grown beyond meeting crisis needs and added programs which address life conditions that keep people in the cycle of poverty.

- PCC now owns the entire north side of the 1200 block of Jamison Avenue.
 Hughes & Associates has prepared early site evaluations and recommendations. Benchmark construction costs ranges a total building fund of \$2-\$3 million needed.
- Future building use possibilities include healthcare, workforce development, and daycare. In addition to the space requirements for Emergency Services and Pathways for Youth, the new structure will also include a community kitchen and classroom/gathering space that can be used for workforce development with the goal of eliminating the barrier of travel for the community.

Through the Mission Build Campaign, Second Presbyterian can offer strategic help right at the point of transition to a growing effort to bring the Southeast community to stability.

WILLIAM R. KLEIN CENTER AT WESTMINSTER HALL RENOVATION CAMPAIGN

Westminster Hall, built in 1897, will be refurbished and recast for a vital, strategic new purpose.

- As a state-of-the-art conference facility, Westminster Hall will provide high-quality continuing education programs for pastors, Christian educators, and other church leaders. It will feature the latest technology and be fully accessible with an elevator to the upper floors.
- **Main Floor:** Proposed Dr. William R. Klein Center, large seminar room with 60-seat capacity, small conference room for 12, kitchenette and coffee room, three offices and support facilities, three break and sitting rooms,

elevator to upper floors. **2nd and 3rd Floors:** 14 lodging suites with private baths, sitting areas on the 2nd floor.

UPSem has set a goal to raise \$2.5 million to establish the Dr. William R. Klein Center on the main floor at Westminster. A centrally located donor recognition plaque at the Center will acknowledge generous gifts.

NON-PROFIT CLINIC IN SAN JUAN DE LA MAGUANA, DR

Second's mission partner, Solid Rock International, is constructing a non-profit clinic that will serve the poorest of the poor while providing opportunities to expand available services to the southwestern region of the Dominican Republic. Access to medical care is something that can be easily taken for granted. In the Dominican Republic, good healthcare is not only difficult to be found, but it more often than not denied to the poor. The clinic is planning to offer new services, with some of them becoming available to the San Juan community for the very first time.

The new clinic will offer:

- 46,242 square feet of clinic space
- 56 beds
- Increase in annual surgical procedures from 600 to 1,000
- Increase in annual patient services provided from 38,000 to 86,000
- New services for the community including: Ambulance Services, Blood Bank, Emergency Care, Endocrinology, Gastroenterology, Neonatal Intensive Care, Ophthalmology, Orthodontics, Orthopedics, Physical Therapy, Radiology, and Urology
