PASTOR'S NOTES

Dr. George C. Anderson

We have many reasons to give thanks!

Nationwide, many churches did not survive the pandemic and many others were weakened. But thanks to outstanding leadership and a committed congregation, Second Presbyterian Church has adapted and is a stronger servant

organization than it was before the pandemic began.

Worship attendance is not yet back to 2019 levels, unless online attendance is added. I think that is important for the future of the church that in person participation in Sunday School and worship continue to rise. Still, I rejoice that we now have the capacity to have so many people join us online.

Mission giving has been outstanding. Discretionary giving to needs identified for the Outreach Offering was high. The Mission Build Campaign was successfully completed and celebrated. Now, more than ever, we are a mission-minded congregation making a real-world impact on Roanoke, the larger church, and the world.

The church staff is transformed. Of full-time staff, four people are new within the last three years: Ben Brannan as Associate Pastor, Nathan Anderson as Business Administrator, Meredith Koliba as Pastors' Assistant, and Alice Light as the Preschool Director. Responsibilities were realigned to better serve the church of the future. The most striking example of that realignment is that Elizabeth Link became our Executive Pastor. We have one of the finest church staffs in the nation.

Finally, we just completed a strong Pledge Campaign. With inflation and a poor stock market, we worried that pledges would be weak. As it turned out, we had our strongest pledge season in at least 15 years. The number of pledges increased, and the pledge total was 10% higher than last year. I believe this increase is due to the exciting mission work the church is doing and the example set by the College of Elders. Of the elders who have served on the session, 83.5% of them pledged and most pledged early.

I am grateful to session leadership that since March 11, 2020 followed a R.A.T.E. plan.

- R: We **R**eacted to the pandemic and did what was necessary to remain safe.
- A: We <u>A</u>dapted to the pandemic by figuring out how to be a church with most of its worship, education and fellowship online..
- T: We **T**ransitioned from the pandemic by bringing back in-person worship and activities.
- E: And now we are **E**merging as a church transformed so as to offer an effective witness in a much-changed world. The emergence continues.

I am grateful for a committed congregation that has remained united while adapting, that has supported the session and pastoral leadership, and has risen so remarkably to the challenge of meeting needs.

And I am grateful for God whom we know in Christ- the God we worship and serve, and whose Spirit has given us such vision and growth.

Of course, we are not done. This is not a Final Report, but an Annual Report. It will tell the story of how we are well positioned to make a remarkable difference in Christ's name in the years to come.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

In many ways, the church looked at 2022 as a rebuilding year. After two years largely apart or socially distanced, the Christian Education Committee recognized that the new building again, and we welcomed year would be an important season of reengaging-programs, volunteers, and relationships. We realized that many people had gotten out of the routine of physically going to worship, Sunday school, and other church programs. So, our goal became focused on inviting people in and working to rebuild and create new connections and friendships among children and adults alike. These connections, we hoped, would help foster a desire for presence and real relationships where Christian nurture could take shape.

At the start of 2022, Sunday Night Kids' Fellowship continued outdoors, incorporating shared meals, music, and recreation for children. Children's Sunday school and Children, Worship, and Wonder continued in person and indoors. Three adult Sunday school classes continued to thrive in the hybrid format, and increasingly, more and more participants joined in person. Midweek adult Bible studies continued to meet in hybrid form, as well. And in May 2022, the committee felt safe enough to offer a pancake breakfast on the last day of Sunday school.

The summer welcomed the Rev. Howard Dudley as our Evening VBS speaker for adults, and Meg Griffith continued her incredible work as our guest children's theater leader,

helping the children share through story, skit, and song the importance and joy of being together. Morning VBS took place in our church around 80 children and 61 adult and youth volunteers. It was thrilling to see the building alive with people of all ages! August saw the return of our annual Trent Getaway churchwide retreat at Eagle Eyrie Conference Center in Lynchburg, VA, a new location for us. The Rev. Dr. Ernie Thompson was our guest speaker, and over 80 children, youth, and adults deepened friendships and explored spiritual practices during this meaningful weekend.

In the fall, the CE Committee couldn't help but gather everyone indoors for breakfast again, and Rally Day set the year off and running. The fall at Second Pres. led to the return of the popular adult Pop-Up Sunday school classes once a month, and the three adult classes continued strong in their participation, tackling topics like Reformed theology, hard sayings of lesus, and faith in today's social and political climate. We redistributed classes for elementary and youth ages to their pre-pandemic classrooms and age divisions, and the confirmation class returned to meeting in the Intersection. Sunday Night Kids' Fellowship met both indoors and outdoors (no more anxiety over weather predictions!), and thanks to the leadership of Alison Conte, December marked the return of the children's Christmas pageant.

YOUTH

When thinking back over the past year, one biblical character keeps coming to mind: Joshua. Joshua was the right-hand-man to Moses as they sought release, and then Moses appointed him as his successor to lead the Israelites into the Promised Land of Canaan. Joshua comes to mind because this year has been a "passing of the torch" kind of year. In May we held a Senior Recognition Sunday for the 28 youth in the Class of 2022; and of these 28 graduating youth, 7 were on Youth Council (a



council of only 8 youth participants). Youth Council for the 2022-2023 program year consists of 8 new members, with one returning from the previous year, and not one of them is a senior. Youth Council members for 2022-2023 are Ellen Mikkelson, Trevor Waters, Cara Wardell, Kit Polly, Sebastien Croteau, Hannah Mizuba, Ryan lanson, Madelyn Lyons, and Henry Smith (who served last year as well). Additionally, our Youth Advisors from previous years have taken a step back and have passed the torch to some new adult leaders. We have welcomed April Lewis, Chris Lewis, and Jim Baynton to our Youth Advisor team!

Just as Joshua was filled with the spirit of wisdom because Moses had laid hands on him, our new leaders on Youth Council and new Youth Advisors bring a spirit of wisdom that they have learned from former leaders in the church, as they seek to serve our youth with energy, intelligence, imagination, and love! I give thanks to God for the commitment of former youth and advisors, and I praise God for renewed wisdom and energy from those who have stepped in this year!

Transitions and change can cause some flux in enthusiasm and participation. But that has not been the case for our youth program!

- Sunday Night Youth Group numbers have been steady with 30+ youth participants from last year to this year!
- In January we confirmed 14 Confirmands as full adult members of the church!
- Youth Sunday was a powerful service with 7 senior sermons and 29 total youth leading worship at both services through song, story, sermon, and sacrament.
- Our first ski trip in over a decade brought 30 youth together at Winterplace Ski Resort for a fun day on the slopes skiing, snowboarding, and tubing!
- Our Bibles & Bricks Mission Trip included 10 youth and 4 adults!
- Saturdays of Service participation last summer totaled 18 youth as we served in the community and here in our own church!
- Each year the Youth help lead Morning VBS, and we had 29 middle and high school youth lead our children through the Wilderness!
- We were one of the largest church groups for Week 6 at Montreat Youth Conference with 18 youth participants and 3 adults!
- It was joy to gather again with the whole church at the Trent Getaway, and we had 18 youth who had a blast playing cards and games, hiking, and walking the prayer labyrinth!
- Our Rally Day Youth Kickoff Cook out welcomed 31 youth and their families together to celebrate the start of a new church year!
- The 2nd-Annual 2PC Youth TRUNK or TREAT welcomed over 200 kids and families from Highland Park Elementary School, Kids SOAR, Humble Hustle, and our very own Second Presbyterian Preschool and Children's Ministry!
- Each year our Middle School youth collect and deliver food for the PCC Hunger Busters Initiative, and we had 14 middle school youth pack, deliver, and organize over 60 bags full of donated pantry items!
- Although our annual Youth Retreat had to be canceled due to Hurricane Ian, 23 enthusiastic youth gathered for an all-day mini-retreat here at the church!



Numbers can only say so much! What cannot be seen in this report through the numbers are the many conversations that happen that leave a lasting impact; the various faith questions that are asked thoughtfully seeking to better understand themselves and their faith; the countless connections youth make with other youth, their mentors, youth advisors, and other church members; and the old and new relationships that are made that remind us of the magic of community as a place of belonging and love!

The Lord told Moses that his time as leader of the Israelites was coming to an end and that he would not enter into the Promised Land. But God had a plan, someone perfect to fill that role. Our youth theme for 2022-2023 is "Lighthouse of Love." Moses was a Lighthouse for the Israelites

leading them and guiding them safely through the wilderness. And when Moses died, Joshua had to shine bright as a light to guide God's people into the future. Our youth are shining bright, stepping into roles of leadership to guide our church into the future! And from what I can see... the future is surely bright!

YOUNG ADULTS

When asked "What makes a young adult program a success?" the responses received all converged into one central idea: consistent opportunities to gather for fellowship. And to take it one step further, fellowship includes good conversation, relationship building, and connections over a shared meal or activity. This past year our young adults have grown closer and closer together as a faith family through such opportunities for fellowship! We gathered for lunch on Sundays, nights out during the week, and even at the homes of generous church members who welcomed us and provided a meal! These fellowship opportunities continue to breathe life into our group as a whole and into each of us individually!

And, this year, as our sanctuary continues to repopulate with faces familiar and new, we have welcomed 35 new members. What's more is that each and every one of them has shared with me a message of gratitude. Our new members are grateful for our pastoral leadership, our missions, our children's ministries, our classes and studies, and, most of all, our warm and welcoming congregation.

So thank you, dear church family, for your help in bringing our visitors and new members into the fold. Every smile, every hello, every invitation is meaningful and important.

SERVICE AND OUTREACH

Beth Smith, Committee Chair

In 2022, the Service and Outreach Committee was able to shift from a focus on urgent pandemic related needs towards a focus on ongoing, forward-looking ways to deepen our calling to be a mission-minded church. The support of the congregation in these efforts has been extraordinary.

The congregation's pledged support is instrumental to our church providing consistent, planned aid to 20 local agencies, Solid Rock International, Beth-El Farmworker Ministry, and the greater PCUSA church. These donations are vital in helping these agencies meet their missions. On top of this pledged giving, the congregation responded to monthly Outreach Offerings by donating just under \$50,000 in additional support of ministries focused on food insecurity, at-risk children, people who are financially disadvantaged, refugees, and isolated seniors.

Through the foresight and thoughtfulness of two families at Second Presbyterian, our church provides additional support to local agencies through funds these families established - the Lil Brown Fund and the Mountain Avenue Fund. In 2022, the Service and Outreach Committee recommended distributions of \$13,000 from the Lil Brown Fund to address mental health issues especially where they intersect with the poor. Additionally, Service and Outreach recommended the inaugural distribution of \$15,850.60 from the Mountain Avenue Fund in support of local ministries dealing with homelessness, poverty, hunger, and at-risk children. Continued contributions to these funds will allow Second Presbyterian to provide ongoing support in the future.

Beyond financial support, our congregation is in the community supporting those in need. Members provided meals for Kids Soar and Family Promise, hosted families of inmates for video conferencing loved ones through AFOI, and packed snacks for the Greene Memorial Summer Pack-a-Snack program for Roanoke City students. Additionally, our involvement with Congregations in Action supports class parties, tutors, Fun Day, and the Pack-a-Snack program at Highland Park Elementary.

The Service and Outreach Committee also coordinated multiple collections throughout the year, collecting diapers and feminine products for refugees, coats for the West End Center, and Angel Tree gifts for seniors. We also donated Christmas cards and stamps to the Local Jail Ministry to be distributed to inmates.

Looking ahead, the Service and Outreach Committee is working to deepen relationships with currently supported agencies and exploring ways to engage the congregation more actively. Our church has partnered with St. John's Episcopal Church to sponsor a home with Habitat for Humanity, and we are hoping to announce a home build in 2023. Additionally, a monthly food collection for the Presbyterian Community Center started in January 2023.

The Service and Outreach Committee remains dedicated to focusing on ministries of compassion in our community. We are grateful for our congregation's continued support and commitment to acting as a mission-minded church.



PODCAST STATS:

International Reach: In 2022, Second on the Mount reached **38** countries! As expected, 90.33% of downloads came from the United States. The next top countries with the most downloads include United Kingdom, Jamaica, and Italy.

National Reach: Bringing our focus closer to home, Second on the Mount reached **40** states with 62.25% of downloads from Virginia. The next four states with the most downloads are California, Oklahoma, and North Carolina.

Performance: As shown in the diagram below, monthly downloads across 2022 trended around 250 per month (with a spike in November), relative to pre-pandemic numbers. Second on the Mount podcast continues to be an important resource, bringing the good news of Christ and the preaching power of Second Presbyterian to our local community, our state, the nation, and the world.

SECOND PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH PRESCHOOL

The past year brought about many exciting changes for the preschool after enduring the pandemic for the previous two school years. Over the course of the year, we were able to retire our "Covid Taskforce" who had helped guide the preschool throughout the pandemic. By gradually eliminating some of the Covid guidelines in place, we brought back our family events and classroom parties planned by the parents. Over the last year, we saw the return of a well-attended Back-To-School Night, a special daytime Grandparents' Tea, and the 4's class presenting a class Nativity Program. In addition, the preschool committee has created more volunteer opportunities for parents of students. Our parent volunteers have helped provide snacks for the staff and special treats for the teachers.

In March of 2022, the preschool hosted an Open House to show off the recent renovations of the school. The preschool received a much-needed renovation to the majority of the first level of the school. Improvements included: exterior locks repaired or replaced, new awnings installed at exterior entrances, updates to the teacher workroom, updated student bathrooms, new floors and ceilings, an updated foyer area, doors were refinished and a fresh coat of paint on everything.

In the summer of 2022, our former preschool director and church member, Dr. Sally l'Anson, announced her resignation from the director position.

Dr. Sally successfully led the preschool through the Covid-19 Pandemic and through a major renovation project. She recruited new teachers into our program and increased staff pay. Dr. Sally implemented a new preschool-wide curriculum that is approved by the Virginia Department of Education. She supported teacher development in current developmentally appropriate practices with a focus on positive child and teacher interactions. She also used her knowledge and skills as a grant writer to help fund the renovation to the preschool and pay for a new playground, which will begin construction later this year. We whole-heartedly thank Dr. Sally for her leadership and continued growth of our

In July 2022, we welcomed Alice Light as the new director of the preschool. Alice is a member of Second Presbyterian and former preschool parent. A classroom teacher with over fifteen years of experience, she felt called to serve her church as the preschool director. She has enthusiastically jumped into her new role with both feet and is leading the preschool with her assistant director, Lori Privott, and a team of fantastic teachers. Alice will be busy, as the preschool classes are completely full this year and next! Please reach out to Alice with interest in available morning and afternoon teaching positions.






