THE EXCITING NEWS OF TWO FUNDS

The Church will observe **Legacy Sunday** on May 4, and members will receive an update on the church's Designated Funds that have been created by special gifts and, even more, bequests. In anticipation of Legacy Sunday (May 4), I want to share with you an exciting report about the major impact two funds have had. Grants for both funds are made based on what is available at the end of 2024 based on a 5% spending policy.

The Lil Brown Fund is part of the Second Fund. Lil Brown's wish was that her bequest was to be used at the session's discretion, but her preference was for outreach, particularly efforts to address mental health concerns. To date, the session and Second Fund directors have not awarded any grants outside Lil's preference.

The Mountain Ave Fund was established by an anonymous couple to fund the ongoing expenses of local ministries and organizations that address issues related to poverty such as homelessness, education and children in crisis. Grants were to go over and beyond what was in the benevolence budget for these outreach organizations. The fund has grown, and these are the grants made from what was available in 2024:

It wasn't that long ago that these two funds did not exist. But they exist now, one because of a bequest and the other because of a gift. And because they exist, they have been able to give \$32,120 over and beyond the benevolences of our church budget.





MAXIMIZING YOUR GIVING:

THE BENEFITS OF QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTIONS (QCDs)

For many faithful givers, supporting Second Presbyterian and charitable causes is a deeply held commitment. If you are 70½ or older and have an Individual Retirement Account (IRA), you have a unique opportunity to make your generosity go further while also receiving potential tax benefits. This can be done through a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD).

What Is a Qualified Charitable Distribution?

A QCD is a direct transfer of funds from your IRA to a qualified charitable organization, such as Second. This type of donation can be an excellent way to support the ministries and missions you care about while also reducing your taxable income. The maximum amount to give through a QCD in 2025 is \$108,000.

Key Benefits of Giving Through a QCD

1. Tax-Free Giving

Unlike regular withdrawals from your IRA, which are typically subject to income tax, a QCD is excluded from your taxable income. This can be especially valuable if you do not itemize deductions and would otherwise miss out on the tax benefits of charitable contributions.

2. Counts Toward Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs)

If you are 73 or older and required to take minimum distributions from your IRA, a QCD can satisfy part or all of your RMD for the year. This means you can fulfill your distribution requirements without increasing your taxable income.

3. May Lower Medicare Premiums and Taxes on Social Security

Because QCDs reduce your adjusted gross income (AGI), they can help you avoid higher Medicare premiums or taxes on your Social Security benefits, which are based on AGI. Many times we overlook this tax saving benefit.

4. Simplifies Your Giving

A QCD is a straightforward way to give directly from your IRA without needing to write checks or manage receipts for tax deductions. Your IRA custodian transfers the funds directly to the church, making the process easy and efficient.

If you are interested in making a QCD, here are the basic steps:

- Contact your IRA custodian and request a direct transfer to the church.
- Ensure that the check is made payable directly to the church or charity (not to you).
- Keep records of the transaction for your tax return.

Giving through a QCD is a powerful way to support Second's mission while also benefiting from tax savings. Whether you wish to contribute to our General Fund, a specific ministry, or an endowed fund, your gift will help make a lasting difference in our congregation and community.

A NOTE FROM PASTOR ELIZABETH

It is hard to believe that this summer will mark my **14th anniversary** serving Second Presbyterian Church. I am grateful to take part in my first 12-week sabbatical this May, June, and July.

The PC(USA) describes a pastor's sabbatical as:

"A planned time of intensive enhancement for ministry and mission. It is an opportunity ... to strategically disengage from regular and normal tasks so that ministry and mission may be viewed from a new perspective. ...Sabbatical Leave is an extension of the Biblical concept of a Sabbath day and a Sabbath year for renewal. It is both an act of faith that God will sustain us through a period of reflection and changed activity, and an occasion for recovery and renewal of vital energies."

I will technically begin my sabbatical on May 2 with many of you, as we depart on our Presbyterian heritage trip to Scotland. Upon my return from our travels, I will begin my Doctor of Ministry studies through Pittsburgh Theological Seminary (a 3+ year hybrid learning program), focusing on the topic of Reformed theology. In addition to my reading, writing, and in-person course attendance in June, I will also spend time at home in Roanoke exploring a new chapter for my children's Christian education podcast, "Child of God," addressing questions of faith.

I am looking forward to this change of pace, and consider this time away a gift. While I am away, Maria Blackshaw and Nancy Gray will be adding extra hours to their weeks, leading Christian education programs (Maria) and assisting with worship leadership and preaching (Nancy). I am grateful for the support they will offer my colleagues in my absence, and am grateful to you for the support and encouragement you will give them (volunteer for Morning VBS to help Maria, if you haven't already!).

Thank you for this time away, Second Presbyterian Church. I know when I return on July 27, it will be renewed and reenergized for my next chapter serving alongside you.

LENT / HOLY WEEK / EASTER 2025

PALM SUNDAY, APRIL 13: Palm Sunday is a special day at Second. As we remember Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, children of all ages are invited to participate in the procession of palms. During the opening hymn, children may process, waving palm branches, to commemorate this holy day.

MAUNDY THURSDAY, APRIL 17: On Maundy Thursday, April 17 at 6:00 p.m., join us in Kirk Hall for a moving and meaningful worship service with communion. On Maundy Thursday the church remembers the last evening Jesus shared with his disciples in the upper room before his arrest and crucifixion. Maundy Thursday marks three key events in Jesus' last week: his washing of his disciples' feet, his institution of the Lord's Supper, and his new commandment to love one another. This service begins the Triduum, the three-day period from sunset on Thursday to sunset on Easter Day. The name 'Maundy Thursday' comes from the



Latin mandatum novum, referring to the 'new commandment' Jesus taught his disciples (John 13:34). In other words, this is 'new commandment Thursday.' Maundy Thursday service is the only midweek service during Holy Week at Second. For this reason, our time of worship will call attention both to the events in the upper room and to the events of Good Friday.

EASTER SUNDAY, APRIL 20: Join us for worship at 8:45 and 11:00 a.m. as we celebrate our risen Lord! Sunday school will <u>not</u> meet on Easter Sunday. We encourage children and adults to bring flowers to decorate the Easter cross (at the 3rd Street entrance) on Easter morning!
