THE SPIRIT STILL SPEAKS: LEARNING FROM ACTS (AND WILLIE JAMES JENNINGS)

I once walked into a meeting at Union Presbyterian Seminary where a cluster of Bible professors were deep in debate. The topic? Whether pastors actually *read through* biblical commentaries or just consulted them when prepping sermons and lessons. One professor decided to put me on the spot. "Tell us honestly," she asked, "have you ever studied a commentary from beginning to end?"

It was my time to shine.

"Many times," I said. "In fact, I'm never *not* studying straight through a commentary."

I could see I had impressed them—and I'll admit I was tempted to leave it there, basking in the admiration of the biblical academy. But I didn't want to give the impression that I was doing this solo. I explained that throughout my ministry, I've been part of clergy study groups that work through books of the Bible together, using thoughtful commentaries as our guides.

My current group (Donna Hopkins Britt, Andrew Whaley, Joy Sylvester Johnson, and Kyle Allen) recently finished working through *Acts* with the help of theologian Willie James Jennings' remarkable commentary. I'd like to share a few of his insights because they speak with urgency and grace to the moment we find ourselves in.

The book of Acts is often framed as a story of church growth—bold apostles,

missionary journeys, dramatic conversions. Jennings challenges that view. He reminds us that Acts is not primarily about the church's success. It is about *God's Spirit* on the move. It's the story of the Gospel's unfolding, as the Spirit breaks through cultural, ethnic, religious, and political boundaries. The Spirit is not tame or predictable, and is certainly beyond anyone's control. The Spirit gathers together a community that only God could imagine.

And that gathering—the proximity of people from different worlds—is dangerous. Jennings says proximity always holds a choice: it can lead to love or to violence. In Acts, we see both. Jew, Gentile, and Roman come into contact with the People of the Way—sometimes joining them, sometimes opposing them.

While the church is not the hero of this story it *is* the story's love interest. The Spirit loves the church in the way that a parent loves a child... raising it to do better. The Spirit won't leave the church alone. Over and over, its people are interrupted, redirected, and re-formed by what God is doing in someone else's life.

Jennings's reading of Acts is a challenge and a call. In a culture that seems increasingly defined by division and isolation, Acts invites us to remain open to how the Spirit is still forming the church God wants. Not by drawing boundaries, but by crossing them. Not through comfort or familiarity, but through love that risks encounter, friendship, and reconciliation. Not through aligning with siloed groups with agendas, but through remaining God's free agent community in the world.

Next up for our group is *Romans*, guided by Beverly Roberts Gaventa's dense 445page commentary. So... don't expect a report any time soon.

A REFLECTION ON EVENING VBS

On the second night of Evening Bible School, Dr. Ed McLeod offered high praise for Second Presbyterian Church. He noted how rare it is for congregations to invest so fully in adult education—hosting not only Sunday school but also evening Bible studies, lecture series, adult retreats, and midweek offerings. He said that nurturing thoughtful, spiritually engaged minds naturally leads to deeper outreach—and Second has consistently demonstrated that truth.

Of course, it helps when we invite gifted teachers like Ed McLeod to lead us. This year, Ed guided us through a rich exploration of faith in the wilderness. But the wilderness he described wasn't just the hardship of life's circumstances—it was also the wilderness of the mind.

While his Sunday sermon spoke movingly about how faith sustains us in the face of loss and suffering, his evening sessions focused more on what happens when we leave behind the simplicity of childhood faith and enter the terrain of "complexity and perplexity." Some may walk away when faith no longer feels simple or certain. But Ed showed us that a more biblical and theologically mature response is to grow into a deeper, humbler place—one where faith is shaped by mystery, awe, and a commitment to love.

I'm grateful for the strong turnout each evening and especially thankful for all who helped make it happen—from the planners to those who prepared meals and refreshments. Events like these remind us that Christian formation is not just for children—it's a lifelong journey. And at Second Presbyterian, we walk that road together.


A NATURAL SOLUTION TO A WARMING PLANET

If you're an avid reader of the **Spotlight**, then you'll remember that the last edition recommended adding **Follow***ing Jesus in a Warming World* to your summer reading list. It emphasizes that caring for creation should be a joyful expression of faith, not a burden. And if you read the newspaper and pay attention to current events, then you're also familiar with this summer's forecast published in the May 31, 2025 edition of the *Roanoke Times*.



Predictions from Old Farmer's Almanac, National Weather Service point to hotter than normal temps

According to NASA and NOAA, "the ten hottest years on record have all occurred in the 21st century, reflecting a clear warming trend. Temperature records began in 1880, when scientists started systematically measuring surface temperatures using weather stations."



In response, The Nature Conservancy has produced a brief 3-minute video entitled, "A Natural Solution to Climate Change" (visit <u>https://youtu.be/t4eE9Fqu1yE</u> or scan the QR code below to watch), depicting a theoretical and hopeful near-future. The video illustrates how humans used Nature to mitigate, remove, and reduce greenhouse gas emissions from the Earth's atmosphere between 2025-2030. **"Nature is the most sophisticated system for**



processing greenhouse gases in the Universe." The years following 2030 saw the atmosphere begin to stabilize and life sustaining ecosystems and biodiversity returning to a healthy balance. Looking back in the years following 2030, our children and grandchildren were thankful for the decisions world leaders took to transition to a renewable clean energy future.

One of the strategies employed in the video is trees. As stated on the City of Roanoke's website, **"Trees provide** vital public services, including improving water quality, improving air quality, temperature control, water absorption, habitat provision, in addition to providing beauty" (*Harmony with Nature*. Plan Roanoke. <u>https://</u> <u>planroanoke.org/harmony-with-nature/</u>). Studies have shown that shade from trees can reduce the air temperature by as much as 10-degrees. For all these reasons and more, government and community leaders are committed to protecting and increasing the city's tree canopy. As you enjoy summer with family and friends, give thanks for the many blessings trees provide.
