PASTOR'S NOTES - DR. GEORGE C. ANDERSON.

BEAUTY WILL SAVE THE WORLD

I have only just begun Brian Zahnd's *Beauty Will Save the World*, but already I know I will finish it. His vision is compelling. He reminds us that most people are not argued into Christian faith, nor are they drawn by our ability to prove Christianity's role in promoting morality. Truth and goodness matter, but it is beauty that opens the heart.

For Brian—and for me—there is no greater beauty than the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. In Him, we see a wisdom that keeps the law with mercy, a compassion that crosses every dividing line, a forgiveness that extends even to his executioners, and a love wide enough to embrace the whole of creation. This is the beauty that does not fade. This is the beauty that calls us home.

It is a sorrow when the church loses sight of this vision and mirrors the world's power games and petty quarrels. But when the church dares to bear witness to this beauty, it is not simply telling a story—it is extending an invitation to meet the living Christ, the One in whom the goodness and beauty of God shines.

As we approach a new program year, my prayer is that our worship, our



Jesus provided his disciples teachings for how to follow Torah, God's word; he told them parables to help them discern questions of ethics and of human nature; he offered them beatitudes for comfort and encouragement. But sometimes Jesus spoke words that followers then and now have found difficult. He instructs disciples to hate members of their own families (Luke 14:26), to act as if they were slaves (Matthew 20:27), and to sell their belongings and give to the poor (Luke 18:22). He restricts his mission (Matthew 10:6); he speaks of damnation (Matthew 8:12); he calls Jews the devil's children (John 8:44).



Exploring The Difficult Words of Jesus by Amy-Jill Levine, we'll learn how these teachings would have sounded to the people who first heard them, how they have been understood over time, and how we might interpret them in the context of the Gospel of love and reconciliation. Contact

THE BIBLE IN BLACK & WHITE: "CONVERSATIONS THAT CHANGE US" (Wednesdays in October @ Noon, Fellowship Hall)

What happens to faith when it becomes more about talking about Jesus than talking to Jesus? Do we risk reducing a living relationship to abstract ideas—Jesus becoming a topic rather than a presence? Does prayer drift into ritual, and ministry into duty, when it's no longer rooted in communion with Christ?

The Gospel of John resists such drift. It is a Gospel built on conversations—long, rich, and transformative ones. From Nicodemus under the cover of night to the Samaritan woman at the well, from a man born blind to Mary, Martha, and Pontius Pilate—Jesus doesn't just talk at people, he speaks with them. And they are never the same.

This October, the Bible in Black & White community will listen in on these conversations—and join them. Our hope is to encounter Jesus as we encounter each other, with open minds, honest hearts, and a willingness to be changed.

The Bible in Black & White will return in the spring for Part II: "Like I Was Saying..." — Conversations Today, Wednesdays in April at Noon (Beginning April 8).

- SECOND PRESBYTERIAN MATTERS -

Take a look at this past summer's church offerings: Evening VBS, Morning VBS, Appalachia Service Project, Montreat Youth Conference, Trent Getaway, Rally Day Picnic—and as noted in last month's Second Sheet, "fall fellowship opportunities are on the horizon—2PC Clubs, the Men's Retreat, and the Gals' Gathering..." Staying engaged in our church family helps us find connection and know the truth about the world around us.

What does this have to do with sustainability? EVERYTHING! Without authentic human connection, how are we as human beings going to LOVE OUR NEIGHBOR, TALK TO ONE ANOTHER, LIVE TOGETHER? Loving our neighbor is at the root of sustainability. It the basis upon which sustainability springs forth. Caring for God's creation and all living things is an act of love. "Do unto others as you would have other do unto you." Staying connected to our church family and neighbors is the difference between thriving and merely surviving.

This brings us back to why Second Presbyterian Church matters. Through worship and music, Christian education, service and outreach, Second Presbyterian offers opportunities for face-to-face (f2f) engagement for those seeking authentic human connection. — THE LIGHT WE SHINE: A TESTIMONY —

As a new member of our church and a newly appointed member of the Stewardship Committee, I'd like to share some of my observations.

Our Stewardship theme for 2025 is The Light We Shine.

I really love this theme! I see the light of Christ shining constantly through the work of our ministers, our pastoral staff, our congregation, our volunteers, and through those who give monetarily to make much of what our church accomplishes a possibility.

During the 90s, I experienced a devastating tragedy. My cousins provided me with the love and kindness which got me through. Christ's light was shining through these long time members of Second, with whom I occasionally attended church.



I can remember Dr. George Anderson when he was new to the church, and years later, his sermons continue to give me new thoughts and perspectives to contemplate.

Our pastors Elizabeth and Ben are tremendous blessings, evidence of Christ's light. Through our pastors and the work of the Visitation Committee, our congregation's needs are seen and attended to, sometimes in unseen ways. Perhaps quietly through prayers, through personal visits and unending encouragement, or through meaningful services and small gatherings.

Humor is present in our church; it's such a wonderful asset! At the right moment, a little humor can also lighten!

Through the church's efforts to encourage and guide our youth, multiple opportunities are provided—preschool, Vacation Bible School, mission trips to areas of devastation in Appalachia to build houses—and the light of Christ truly shines.

Extensive adult education is available for us, and we see Christ's light especially shining when we join with other churches to offer our community a chance to grow together, to get past stumbling blocks that separate us. Church retreats, seminars for further learning, and Sunday school classes are all reminders of and reflective of Christ's light and His teachings.

Community outreach—one of the reasons I've been especially drawn to our church—is supportive of organizations who help so many. In this area, Christ's light shines through and extends well beyond our church.

There is more... I will add that when I volunteer at the front desk during the week and meet people coming and going, I am so glad that I came to this church community.

Each and every day, I see many examples of what Christ wants us to do and be. I invite you to look for these examples in your own life and witness, too.
