

PASTOR'S NOTES - DR. GEORGE C. ANDERSON

THE EDMUNDS LECTURES AND THE VOICE WE NEED RIGHT NOW

Every once in a while, a scholar captures the imagination of mainline pastors—not simply because they're brilliant, but because their voice is uniquely tuned to the challenges of a particular moment.

For previous generations, that voice may have been Harry Emerson Fosdick, Karl Barth, or Reinhold Niebuhr. When I was in seminary, it was Fred Craddock, who revolutionized the way we think about preaching. Later, Walter Brueggemann reignited interest in the Old Testament's prophetic voice. Eugene Peterson gave pastors a compelling vision of vocational faithfulness (and gave the wider church *The Message*). Richard Rohr reintroduced ancient practices of contemplation to contemporary seekers.

Today, it may be Andrew Root's moment.

In recent years, I've found myself in conversation—at continuing education events, over coffee, in clergy gatherings—where Root's name keeps coming up. Pastors across the theological spectrum are reading his books, quoting his insights, and wrestling with his vision for ministry in what he calls a secular age.

Root has a rare ability to diagnose not only the symptoms but also the underlying cultural conditions shaping the life of the church. Drawing deeply on philosopher Charles Taylor, he helps pastors understand why traditional models of ministry often feel out of step—not because people have stopped needing God, but because the social and cultural scaffolding that once supported belief has shifted dramatically.

And yet, he writes not with nostalgia for the past or panic about the future, but with honesty, pastoral sensitivity, and theological depth. His work resonates because it names what many pastors feel but struggle to articulate: a disorienting gap between our call to proclaim the gospel and the cultural moment in which we are called to do it.

That's why we invited Andy Root to deliver this year's *Edmunds Lectures*. And that's why, when he agreed, we also invited him to take part in something more: a two-day *Cornerstone Colloquy* with pastors from around the country who are actively engaging his work.

When he said yes, Elizabeth Link, Andrew Whaley, and I began planning the colloquy and reached out to 18 pastors we hoped would attend. We expected a number of regrets.

We were wrong. All 18 said yes.

So, on **Monday and Tuesday, November 10–11**, Andy Root will meet during the day with these pastors and offer public lectures each evening at 7:00 p.m. This will be a unique opportunity not only for our congregation but for the wider church to hear from one of the most compelling theological voices of our time.

On the preceding **Sunday, November 9**, we will welcome Rev. Adam Hearlson to our pulpit. A colloquy participant and professor of preaching, Rev. Hearlson brings a creative and incisive voice that will help set the stage for the week to come.

A FEW WORDS ABOUT MESSIAH... Composer: G.F. Handel, 1685-1759 | Librettist: Charles Jennens, 1700-1773 | First Performance: Dublin, April, 1742

Handel's Messiah. Nearly everyone in the Western World is familiar with these two words. The piece has been a favorite among audiences and musicians for nearly 300 years.

Messiah is probably the most famous example of the oratorio but, when it debuted, its construction was atypical of Italianate examples of the genre which were the norm. As with operas, oratorios had a plot, characters, or narrative. These characteristics are not found in Messiah. Instead, its tripartite structure outlines Christ's birth, death and resurrection as described by passages (selected by Jennens) from the Old and New Testaments. And so, because of its enormous popularity it became the model for oratorio composition in the years that followed.

Complete performances of Messiah (fifty-three movements and about 100 minutes in length) in Europe are common during Lent. North American audiences, however, have come to prefer Part One, "The Christmas Portion," (using Hallelujah, from the conclusion of Part Two). Not only has the first part become a treasured enhancement of Advent but, at just under one hour in length, it's much more manageable for amateur singers to master and busy audiences to enjoy.

From its beginnings, Messiah has been a malleable work resulting in a broad range of performances. For example, while Handel had thirty-two singers in his first performances, over the decades that number has continued to expand. By the late-eighteenth century, the numbers of singers increased to the point that Mozart created an expanded orchestral edition that included three trombones, clarinets—not in Handel's orchestral palette—and greatly increased strings. The larger the choral forces, the larger the orchestras needed to balance the singers and the larger spaces needed to hold them all. These trends continued until the late nineteenth century in London, where a performance by 4,000 musicians was reported.

Following Handel's practice, arias might still be assigned to different voice types from performance to performance. For example, "But Who May Abide" now often sung by a bass, received settings by Handel for the counter tenor, alto and second soprano.

Handel composed and added pieces in 1743 and 1745, two and three years after the debut, and finally in 1750, when he added "But Who May Abide" and another aria in Part Two. Handel also refashioned earlier arias into choruses on at least four occasions. For example, in Part One, "For Unto Us a Child is Born" began life as an aria from his Italian cantata, *No, di voi non-vo 'fidarmi*. The choruses "He Shall Purify," "His Yoke is Easy," and "All We Like Sheep" (Part Two) had similar soloistic beginnings, explaining their virtuosic vocal lines in those choruses.

This December, the Chancel Choir's performance will draw from the flexibility allowed by Baroque practice, performance traditions and the limitations and opportunities available. For example, we will have the soloists sing two of the choruses that Handel repurposed from aforementioned solo works, ("He Shall Purify" and "For Unto Us") as solo quartets, not as full choruses.

It is hoped that new dimensions of Handel's genius are revealed in meaningful ways, enhancing listeners' experiences and celebration of the season.

LEGACY CORNER

If you are age 73 or older, you know about the *Required Minimum Distribution* (RMD). Every year, the government requires you to take money out of your retirement account—whether you need it or not.

But here's the good news: that requirement can become a blessing. Many in our church family have discovered the joy of using their RMD to support the ministry of Second Presbyterian.

When you give your RMD directly to the church, you're not just meeting a rule—you're feeding the hungry, nurturing children and youth, maintaining a place of worship, and sharing God's love in countless ways. What once felt like a burden becomes an opportunity to bless others.

One member said: "I never liked being told I had to take money out, but when I realized I could send it to the church, it felt right. Now I see my gift at work."
